Virginia's membership delegation has footprints in the halls of Congress, the Department of Defense, the Central Intelligence Agency and other high-profile institutions in the nation's capital. Past National Commander Dan Daniel, for example, was elected to Congress. At the same time, posts throughout the commonwealth exemplify the Legion's Four Pillars at the grassroots level with activities in their communities. A prime example of the Legion's commitment to youth occurs every summer when 98 Boys Nation participants descend on Marymount University for a week of leadership training, bonding and fun, overseen by American Legion volunteers and staff members.


VA Legionnaires

Buck's cannon

irginia is a state rich with history and full of American Legion members dedicated to preserving memories of past wars. It should be no surprise that an American Legion post worked tirelessly to restore an artifact dating to World War I, the time of the organization's founding.

American Legion Post 104 in Appomattox Court House has dedicated a World War I-era cannon, a project that united local veterans and the community. The dedication was more than a year in the making as the cannon was restored after being acquired by James "Buck" Owen, a past post commander.


Owen discovered the cannon on a property near his home during a walk. After the landowner passed away, the family donated it to Owen.


Much of the cannon was rusted. The wheels' wooden spokes were rotted. Birds' nests filled the barrel. Post members, including Owen, began to restore it, disassembling the iron pieces using an acetylene torch and impact wrench. The post reached out to an expert who does restoration work for the Smithsonian Institute; he rebuilt the wheels using the original rims and hubs.

Post members wire-brushed every part before priming, then researched to find the correct olive drab paint.

After thousands of hours of labor and about \$16,000 in costs, the 3-inch field gun went back on the cannon. It was not restored to look new, but to look authentic.

"We left all the bullet dings in it and everything," Owen said. "We wanted it to look the part."





■ **Post 270** in McLean lists a who's-who in U.S. military history among its members, including Gen. Alexander Haig, a former White House chief of staff and former Secretary of State; former Defense Secretary Chuck Hagel; and Gen. Colin Powell, former Secretary of State.

Arlington National Cemetery: In Arlington, across the Potomac River from the nation's capital, 624 acres of hallowed ground house the final resting places for the nation's war dead.



The Carillon Tower: The American Legion supported and helped fund the 240-foot, 56-bell tower, a memorial to the 3,700 Virginians who died fighting in World War I. The Richmond landmark can still be played today. A carillonneur strikes a pedal keyboard just below the bell chamber.



Virginia War Memorial: The American Legion hosts both Veterans Day and Memorial Day events at the Virginia War Memorial in the heart of Richmond, 621 S. Belvidere St. The Legion was instrumental in the memorial's creation from a support role and contributed \$1,000. The memorial features a museum and education center named for American Legion member and former POW Paul Galanti. The Paul and Phyllis Galanti Education Center features exhibits featuring all of America's wars, 18 award-winning movies in its theater and the Shrine of Memory, which has the names of more than 11,600 Virginians killed in war.

Joint Leadership Council (JLC): The American Legion Department of Virginia leads a group of 23 veterans service organizations that meet throughout the year and devise a wish list for the state legislature. While the Legion still advocates directly with state lawmakers, the JLC represents all veterans throughout the state. Its wish list prioritizes the issues on behalf of more than 250,000 veterans. Among the JLC's successes: pushing through legislation that reduced tuition rates for state veterans.

Legion Baseball: Houston Astros starting pitcher Justin Verlander, who won the American League Most Valuable Player and Cy Young awards in 2011, played American Legion Baseball for Powhatan Post 201.

Verlander has returned to his roots to throw out the first pitch at various Legion Baseball games.

Oratorical contest: Virginia boasts two winners of the national Oratorical contest, Jeanne Mann Dickinson of Roanoke in 1951 and Keith R. Finch of Blacksburg in 1983.

slogan – "Retreat, hell" – as its motto today.

VA Claims Builder

Service officers in Virginia voluntarily assist veterans with getting their health-care claims taken care of efficiently. Service officers are assisted by a digital tool helps them improve the accuracy and timeliness of VA claims.

The Mil-Vet Advocacy Project, Inc. website, which ensures privacy, walks service officers through a series of questions with veterans for a comprehensive review of their claims. The information, which can be saved and updated later, is private – each veteran selects a personal identification number to log in to their

In the first few months of using the digital tool, service officers were able to file nearly 300 claims - a much higher rate than before. It can be used to help veterans from all war eras, whether or not they are already in the VA system.

"It's a huge event, it's the cornerstone event for the American Legion Riders chapter we have here," said Bright, the chapter's head road captain. "We do a lot of other things, veterans outreach and more, but this is probably number one for us."
